We celebrate that lately we've had a few baptisms and that the sweet babies and toddlers have been declared children of God. One of the exciting things about a baptism is that the parents, the sponsors, and even the congregation (or church family—all of you) promises to help that child know they are loved by God, that they will come to worship, that they will grow as disciples to live in God's love and care for the world God made.

As part of the baptismal promise, we at St. John's offer a catechism program for youth in approximately grades 5-7. In January, we started doing this catechism in a new way, and I wanted to give you an update.

First, our catechism youth gather each week during the Sunday School hour. Two Sundays of the month Heather and Chuck Ruggles teach the catechism youth classic Sunday School, going in depth into scripture, tradition, and our church year. On the other two Sundays of the month, I teach topics from the catechism. This month, we will study Holy Communion, why we take Communion, and what a gift it is.

You may have noticed that our youth are also becoming more involved in Sunday morning worship. They are encouraged to participate in any way that they feel comfortable. As I've listened to them, I've found that the more they participate, the more that worship makes sense to them.

These youth have also agreed to meet with mentors. They have chosen mentors who they feel radiate Jesus' love and who they believe will help them grow in their own faith. As they meet with mentors, they talk about prayer, living lives of faith, scripture, worship, and anything else that is on their minds. Please pray for the youth and their mentors.

The youth are keeping track of their activities, because they are trying to get 100 points each year. They receive points for being in worship, assisting in worship, visiting our homebound members, attending team meetings, volunteering, working in the giving garden, singing in the choir, visiting other congregations, and basically growing as disciples.

Would you be willing to help our youth and keep our baptismal promises? We can only cover so much in class on Sunday mornings, but you have even more to offer to them. Would you talk with the youth about what they're learning, and share your own traditions? Would you invite them to join a team meeting? Would you share why worship is meaningful and important for you? Would you pray for them?

Thank you for the many ways you welcome even the youngest to be an important part of the body of Christ. We are all needed, and we all have gifts to share. Thank you for sharing yours.

ST. JOHN'S LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING March 5, 2019

CALL TO ORDER: President, Ann Voight, called the meeting to order at 7 PM.

PRAYER: Pastor Stacy led us in an opening prayer. She read Deuteronomy 6:4-9 and asked how we might today frame the laws of God as "gifts" rather than "burdens".

MEMBERS PRESENT: Ann Voight, Kevin Young, Peg Kingsley, Colleen Shupe, Pastor Stacy, Jerrie Krawetzki, Paula Hoffman, Ron Zorn, Jeff Justi, Bob Krawetzki, Jenna Stacy

EXCUSED: Bonny Ambos, Barry Laird

MINUTES: February Council minutes and a recap of the Congregational Council Retreat, both held on February 2nd, were approved as written on motion by Bob Krawetzki and seconded by Jerrie Krawetzki. Motion passed by unanimous voice vote.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Colleen Shupe presented the January treasurer's report as of Jan. 31st:

The report has been reviewed in detail by the Finance Team. Ron Zorn moved and Paula Hoffman seconded that we accept the treasurer's report. Motion passed by unanimous voice vote.

Pastor Stacy: Written report submitted. Pastor Stacy talked about the positive experience she had at the prayer retreat that she attended in February. She asks that anyone in the congregation needing to talk with her to please contact her at any time. She welcomes meeting with members. Pastor Stacy has already given us a detailed list of vacation and/or other work related absences planned for 2019 and well into 2020. This enables us to easily plan ahead for her Sunday replacements.

Property Team: Written report submitted. Jeff Justi reported that the Property Team met on Feb. 28th and would get a copy of the minutes to Council by email. He submitted the following Heating/Cooling Policy that the Property Team is recommending Council adopt:

Heating: Boiler...3 zones. All thermostats will be set at 70 degrees. The wall mounted units (heat pumps) in the sanctuary will be used only for emergency back up.

Cooling: The Mitsubishi heat pump units in the sanctuary will be set at 73 degrees. The controllers will be stored in the cabinet by the audio equipment so there is no public access to them. These units can also function as a fan and have 20 different directional settings, 4 up and down...5 different left to right. Also 3 different speed settings.

Ceiling fans: Not needed. Maybe in certain occurrences, when nearing capacity seating, ex. Funerals. Small heaters in narthex should be turned on by the ushers in the winter. This would help the heat distribution at the back of the church.

The humidifier should run all summer long in the basement. If someone is passing by please empty it.

Paula Hoffman moved and Bob Krawetzki seconded that Council approve this recommendation. Motion passed by unanimous voice vote.

Worship Team: A representative from the Synod will be here on Sunday, March 10th, to talk to the congregation about the work being done in Tanzania. Worship Team will see that all those who sign up for supplying altar flowers have their flowers used on the altar. Any other flower contributions will be placed on the organ. When ordering flowers from a florist make sure that donors name appears on the order so that Worship Team can be certain where the flowers should be placed within the church.

Finance Team: Written report submitted. Ron Zorn shared that the Endowment Committee met on February 28th and have allotted \$10,000 to be used for the parking lot resurfacing. The money will remain in the endowment account until needed. Ron also shared that the Finance Team has been exploring online giving programs that St. John's might utilize as another way for members to make contributions to our church. The program they are recommending is Tithe.ly. This is the only program of its kind that the ELCA endorses and comes highly recommended by current users. After discussion Jerrie Krawetzki recommended and Bob Krawetzki seconded that we adopt this program. Motion carried by unanimous voice vote. Ray Vance has worked with this company for other churches and has volunteered to help us set up the program. Ron will contact Ray Vance as to when he would be able to begin working on this with us. Colleen passed out forms to be used by anyone using a credit card to purchase something for St. John's. This is most important that all ministry team leaders use these forms to enable Colleen to correctly code the purchases in her reporting.

Faith/Life Team: Written report submitted. Paula Hoffman reported that her team has ordered two shorter movies to be shown on Movie Night. Since many of the children who attend movie night are younger, perhaps one movie will suffice for their shorter attention spans. Her team is looking at options as to how to continue their work with Crossroads. Supper Club will meet on April 23rd.

Under other reports: Ann Voight will follow up with Barry Laird to make sure that he is mentored on how to make the church service recordings.

OLD BUSINESS:

Bob Krawezki will email to Ann Voight the 2018 Team Timelines that he has received to date

NEW BUSINESS:

Council Prayer Request for March worship bulletin: Council asks for prayers and guidance for our third Seminarian, Kriss Buss, for balancing her family, work and education.

As discussed at our Retreat, Ministry Teams will begin in the fall of this year to be highlighted on the first Sunday of the month. Team leaders are encouraged to sign up for a "Team Month".

Colleen moved and Jerrie seconded that we hold our 2019 Annual Meeting on February 9th, 2020.

Council signed a card welcoming Dan Gutman as the next seminarian that we will be sponsoring.

Council is recommending that we post a calendar for team leaders to place their group's meeting times and events throughout the year. This is to avoid having more than one group needing to use the upper room at the same time on any given day.

Announcements: March 6, Ash Wednesday; Lent, March 6 through April 18. Next Council meeting, April 2nd.

Colleen Shupe moved and Jerrie Krawetzki seconded that we adjourn the meeting. We adjourned by singing the Doxology.






Everyone is invited. April 14th the youth Sunday school classes will study communion and learn from Ann Witt how to make our delicious bread. We gather at 9 am.
